Coalition Seeks Innovative States

We are looking for states that can lead the country in developing and showcasing innovative ways to protect state drinking water sources through better land use management and water protection programs. Under a grant from the US Environmental Protection Agency, the Trust for Public Land and the Smart Growth Leadership Institute will select two states as partners for a program focused on *Enabling Source Water Protection: Aligning State Land Use and Water Protection Programs*.

The program, now entering its third year, helps states to implement effective drinking water source protection across program and agency boundaries in order to better support efforts at the local and watershed levels. Working with state program managers, recognized national experts in land use, land conservation, and water quality protection will identify opportunities to align policies and requirements across relevant state programs (such as drinking water protection, ground and surface water protection, natural resource management, agriculture, growth management, and land conservation programs).

State programs often influence decisions at the local or watershed levels, though conflicts between state programs and policies may lead to unintentional confusion about the responsibilities and priorities of local source water protection partners. This program will encourage more effective collaboration among various stakeholders and better congruence between various state policies and programs to enhance source water protection.

Benefits to States

- Consultations with experts on innovative practices from around the country.
- Exposure to other state examples and strategies.
- Recommendations based on state-specific program reviews.
- Strategies for improving funding for water protection.
- A support network—both within and outside of government—for implementation.

This program has a two-step application and selection process to choose the partner states.

Expression of Interest:

Interested parties within states should submit the two-page *Expression of Interest* form available for download at www.landuseandwater.org. Please submit the completed form by email to Elizabeth Schilling with the Smart Growth Leadership Institute eschilling@smartgrowthamerica.org **on or before close of business your time February 5, 2010.**

Any state agency may submit the form. Submissions may come from the Governor's office and/or state level departments related to environmental protection, public health, natural resources, or planning and growth management.

Because this announcement is being distributed by several national organizations related to land use, water protection and natural resources, there may be other agencies or organizations in your state that will also be interested in this project. We would prefer (but do not require) the coordination of efforts within a state into a single *Expression of Interest* submission. Should we receive more than one *Expression of Interest* from a state, we will contact all submitters and request that you work together to submit a joint *Expression of Interest* within one week of notification.

State agencies may also want to coordinate their submission with watershed groups, state smart growth or growth management organizations, extension agencies, and other non-profit organizations working on source water. Organizations outside state government should coordinate with state officials to apply.

States who have applied for previous rounds of this project are encouraged to re-apply.

Formal Application:

We will review all expressions of interest and select the states that offer the strongest commitment to the project and most potential for undertaking cross-program analysis (see critical criteria posted at www.landuseandwater.org). These states will be asked to submit a more detailed, formal application on or before March 19, 2010. We will select two partner states in this year, and expect to announce the selections by March 31, 2010.

Partnering Organizations

The **Trust for Public Land** (TPL) is a private non-profit organization that works nationwide to conserve land for people to enjoy as parks, gardens, and other natural places, ensuring livable communities for generations to come. Since 1972, TPL has completed more than 3,000 conservation transactions in 46 states, totaling more than 2 million acres. TPL has helped states and communities craft and pass over 330 ballot measures, generating \$25 billion in new conservation-related funding. With support from EPA in 2002, TPL led the Source Water Stewardship project to build locally based drinking water protection efforts that incorporated land conservation and forest management in four different watersheds. The initial investment of \$396,000 was leveraged to create over \$25 million of public and private dollars.

The **Smart Growth Leadership Institute** (SGLI), a project of Smart Growth America, was created by former Maryland Governor Parris N. Glendening to help state and local elected, civic and business leaders design and implement effective smart growth strategies. SGLI manages the *Governors' Institute on Community Design* a national, non-partisan program created specifically to assist governors, their cabinet, and top staff as they make investments in their communities and guide growth and development in their states.

The **Association of State Drinking Water Administrators** (ASDWA) serves the drinking water program administrators in the 50 states, territories, the Navajo Nation, and the District of Columbia. ASDWA supports states in their efforts to protect public health through the assurance of high quality drinking water; assists all state program administrators with information and data; encourages the interchange of experience among state drinking water programs; promotes responsible, reasonable, and feasible drinking water programs at the state and Federal levels; and provides advice, counsel, and expertise to organizations and entities having an interest in drinking water.

River Network is a national nonprofit organization working for clean and healthy waters. River Network is unique among national organizations because it supports grassroots groups working for watershed protection. By providing information, training, consultation and connections, River Network enhances the efforts of many other organizations, whose work, in turn, benefits hundreds of millions of people from coast to coast. The network consists of thousands of organizations, including grassroots watershed associations, statewide conservation groups, large river basin groups, Native American tribes, fishing and boating associations, businesses, state and federal governmental agencies and other national environmental organizations.
